

A Conversation about Race

Following the brutal killing of George Floyd on a Minneapolis street on Monday 25 May 2020, many in our own community as well as around the world have connected with deep pain and anger about the ongoing systemic racism that still exists today. George Floyd's death has highlighted the necessity for an open and honest conversation about race both in our city and our church. On Sunday 7 June, John and Debby Wright had a conversation about race with three black members of our church family, Dan, Caroline and Dave with the desire to grow in our understanding as a church.

On Monday 8 June, many of us lit candles in our homes as a symbol of grief and of hope and also as a pledge to examine our own hearts, to listen, to love our neighbours and to speak out against injustice where we see it trentv.org/georgefloyd. We committed ourselves to continue the conversation long after this story disappears from the headlines. This continuing invitation includes an invitation for each of us to lament as we reflect on the prejudice within our own hearts and the impact of racism on our black and brown brothers and sisters.

On Sunday 12 July, John Wright, in his talk <u>we need to talk</u> <u>about race'</u>, spoke to us about some of the reality of racism and then went on to talk about the opportunity before us as a church community reflecting on:

- 1. Racism and racial injustice are part of our history.
- 2. Racism and racial injustice are part of our present.
- 3. Many of our black and brown brothers and sisters are in pain.
- 4. We want to be part of the solution.
- 5. We have an opportunity for real change.

"As a leadership team we sense that this is a transformational season, where the Lord is drawing us to engage with Him emotionally and spiritually. We are keen that busyness and striving to re-engage do not crowd out the present opportunity for us as a church to hear from, and be shaped by, God. We feel led to take time to process and lament difficult issues that have emerged during lockdown, particularly the issue of racial injustice. The Lord is stirring a vision that we must seek a future for our church where 'every nation, tribe, people and language belong and flourish' (Revelation 7:9)"
